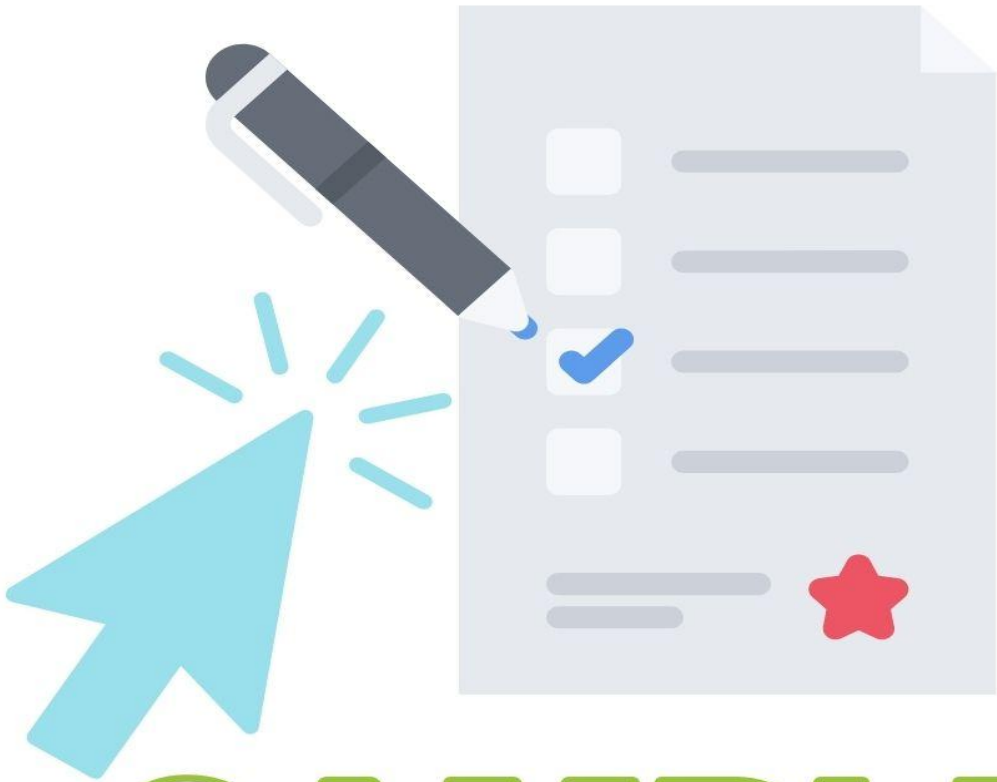

A letter from our campaign:

Dear Hidalgo County Voter,

The information this Voters' Pamphlet provides is designed to assist you in participating in the **March 1, 2022**, Primary Election. We know it is hard to know what information to trust with all the information and misinformation we experience in our lives today, especially during a primary election with so many candidates running for each seat. Yours is a difficult job to sort through it all to make an informed decision. And while we know it is hard, we know you can and will do it.

We recognize that with unlimited sources of information it can be challenging to find information that is accurate and trustworthy. Fortunately, there are some simple questions you can ask yourself to help identify misinformation: 1) Is there any data or evidence presented to support the information? 2) Does this information seem designed to push my political buttons? 3) Is there something about this information that doesn't seem right or too bizarre to be true? 4) Who is sharing this information? 5) Does this individual or group have an agenda? **Be an informed voter and don't believe everything you see or hear.**

Texas elections officials work hard to make sure that you, the voters, get to decide who wins the election and it is not impacted by the voting rules or system. New laws in Texas may make this process seem more difficult, implementing new hurdles for voters, but we are here to help you overcome any hurdle you might face.

The biggest threat we have to elections today continues to be misinformation. It can be found in many sources — social media, traditional media, statements by candidates and elected officials, email lists, text message chains and mailers. That's why we put together this nonpartisan voters guide to help you get straight to the information that will help you decide which candidates support policies that align with your values. All of our information was collected from the County Elections Division and the candidates themselves; either by sorting through their social media, mailers, other content they produce, or by listening to their interviews and candidate forums.

Early voting begins February 14. You can visit any voting center in Hidalgo County between February 14 and February 28. The deadline to request a ballot by mail is February 18th. 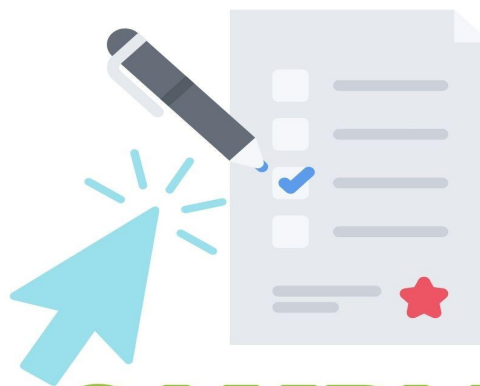

Frequently Asked Questions (*Preguntas Frecuentes*)

Who can Register?

You are eligible to register and vote if you are:

- A) a citizen of the United States,
- B) a resident of Hidalgo County,
- C) at least 17 years and 10 months of age and you must be 18 years of age by election day,
- D) not declared mentally incompetent by a court of law.
- E) not a convicted felon, if so convicted you have:
 - a) fully discharged your sentence, including any term of incarceration, parole, supervision, or completed a period of probation ordered by any court; or,
 - b) been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disability to vote.

When can I register to Vote?

You can register any time, however, you must be registered to vote 30 days before an election in which you plan to vote.

How often do I have to register to vote?

You only need to register one time, however, if you have an address change or name change you will need to notify our office in writing as soon as possible.



Am I able to change my address or apply for a Voter Registration card online?

Although you cannot apply online, you can go to (<https://txapps.texas.gov/tolapp/sos/SOSACManager>) where you can update your address information but only if you are currently registered to vote.

How can I find out if I am registered to vote or if you have my correct address?

You can call the voter registration office at 318-2570 and they will verify your registration. If you are not registered to vote or have an incorrect address our office will mail you a voter registration application.

Must a Texas Drivers License (TDL)# be provided on a VR application?

Yes, this is new legislation but other information can included in place of the TDL# (such as the last four digits of a social security number).

How do I get the voter registration canceled if my family member is deceased?

Send a letter requesting cancellation to the Voter Registration Office stating that the voter is deceased. Include the name of the voter, registration address and date of birth. Sign your name and record your relationship to the voter beside your name (i.e husband, wife, son, daughter, etc).

I just moved into Hidalgo County but never registered to vote. This being Election Day, can I still practice my right to vote?

Are you registered in another county? When did you move? Otherwise, you can fill out a VR card to register you for the next election. A provisional ballot can also be offered but will not be counted if you are not registered.

What if I move?

If you have recently moved, please provide our office with your new address as soon as possible. This process will help with the delivery of your voter registration certificate



Do I need to bring my voter certificate/card? Will I be able to vote without it?

While you do not need to bring your voter registration certificate with you to vote, we highly recommend that you have it with you at the polling place. In some situations, having your voter registration certificate will allow you to vote a regular ballot instead of a provisional ballot. For example, if you do not possess one of the seven (7) acceptable forms of identification, and you cannot obtain one due to a reasonable impediment, you can use your valid voter registration certificate as a form of supporting identification when you execute your Reasonable Impediment Declaration, and vote a regular ballot. As another example, if your name does not appear on the official list of registered voters in the precinct, you may be able to cast a regular ballot by presenting your valid voter registration certificate along with an acceptable form of photo identification. In addition, for example, if you do not possess one of the seven (7) acceptable forms of identification, and you cannot obtain one due to a reasonable impediment, and your name is not on the official list of registered voters in the precinct, you may be able to cast a regular ballot by presenting your valid voter registration certificate and executing a Reasonable Impediment Declaration.

Please note that you may contact your county voter registrar's office to obtain a replacement registration certificate. You may call (956)318-2570.

I want to speak to someone in the Republican/Democratic party or contact a particular candidate.

The phone numbers of the parties are: Republicans: 956-803-0111 , Democrats: 956-250-4739. The candidates file with the party and therefore can provide their campaign headquarters' phone number. If those numbers do not work, dial (1411) for information as the Elections Office does not carry contact numbers for candidates.

ACCEPTABLE PHOTO IDS

You can cast a regular ballot if you present one of the following IDs. Must be unexpired or expired up to 4 years. ID can be expired more than 4 years if you are 70 years or older:

- Texas Driver's License
- Texas Personal ID Card
- Texas Election ID Certificate
- Handgun License
- Military ID Card
- US Passport
- US Citizenship Certificate (does not expire)

If you do not have one of the IDs listed above, you can cast a regular ballot if you present a supporting form of ID:

- Voter registration certificate, or
 - Certified US (including territory) birth certificate, or
 - Current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck (must show your name and ANY address) or
 - Government check (must show your name and ANY address) or
 - Any other government document showing your name and ANY address (examples: an out-of-state license, a government employee ID)
- AND
- Complete and sign "Reasonable Impediment Declaration"

Important note: An election officer is not permitted to question the reasonableness of your impediment to getting an ID.

Voters with Disabilities (*Votantes con discapacidades*)

Services Available to Voters with Disabilities in Texas

Voter Registration

- People with disabilities have the right to register to vote so long as they are eligible, which means they:
 - Are citizens of the United States;
 - Are at least 17 years and 10 months old at time of registration (but to vote, they must be 18 years of age by Election Day);
 - Have not been finally convicted of a felony, or if they have been convicted, have completed all of their punishment, including any term of incarceration, parole, supervision, probation, or have received a pardon;
 - Note: Deferred adjudication is not a final felony conviction.
 - Have not been determined by a final judgment of a court exercising probate jurisdiction to be totally mentally incapacitated or partially mentally incapacitated without the right to vote.
- Individuals who have legal guardians may be eligible to register, depending on whether the court took away their right to vote. All guardianship orders issued after September 1, 2007 must state whether the individual can vote.
- People with disabilities can receive assistance registering to vote from any state agency that provides services to persons with disabilities or from any person they choose.

Accessible Voting Systems

- On September 1, 1999, Texas became the first state to require that all new voting systems be accessible to voters with disabilities and provide a practical and effective means for voters with disabilities to cast a secret ballot.
- In every federal election (and most non federal elections), each polling place will offer at least one type of accessible voting equipment. This equipment allows voters with disabilities to vote directly on the system or assist them in marking the paper ballot. Depending on the type of system, voters with disabilities may use headphones or other assistive devices to help them vote independently and secretly.
- In certain non federal elections held in counties with a population of less than 20,000, accessible machines may not be available at every polling place. To determine if accessible machines will be



available or to request an accommodation, contact the early voting clerk of the county or political subdivision holding the election at least 21 days before the election.

All Polling Places in Texas Must be Accessible

Polling places should support voters, not hinder them. When you go to the polls in Texas, you can expect:

- Your polling place will meet strict accessibility standards, including:
- A location on the ground floor that can be entered from the street or via an elevator with doors that open at least 36 inches
- Doors, entrances, and exits used to enter or leave the polling place that are at least 32 inches wide
- Any curb next to the main entrance to the polling place must have curb-cuts or temporary non-slip ramps
- Stairs necessary to enter or leave the polling place must have handrails on each side and a non-slip ramp
- Removal of all barriers such as gravel, automatically closing gates, closed doors without lever-type handles, or any other barrier that impedes the path of a person with physical disabilities to the voting station
- Voting systems that are accessible to voters with physical disabilities and can accommodate no vision, low vision, no hearing, low hearing, limited manual dexterity, limited reach, limited strength, no mobility, low mobility, or any combination of the foregoing (except the combination of no hearing and no vision)
- Each polling place will offer at least one type of accessible voting equipment. This equipment allows voters with disabilities to vote directly on the system or assist them in marking the paper ballot. Depending on the type of system, voters with disabilities may use headphones or other assistive devices to help them vote independently and secretly.

Voters May Receive Assistance at the Polls

If you need assistance at the polls, tell the election official if you are a voter who needs help to vote. You do not have to provide proof of your disability. Voters are entitled to receive assistance if they:

- Cannot read or write; or
- Have a physical disability that prevents them from reading or marking the ballot; or



- Cannot speak English, or communicate only with sign language, and want assistance in communicating with election officials.

Voters may be assisted by:

- Any person the voter chooses who is not an election worker;
- Two election workers on Election Day; or
- One election worker during early voting.

Voters MAY NOT be assisted by:

- Their employer;
- An agent of their employer; or
- An officer or agent of their union.

The person assisting the voter must read him or her the entire ballot, unless the voter asks to have only parts of the ballot read. The person assisting the voter must take an oath that he or she will not try to influence the voter's vote and will mark the ballot as the voter directs. If the voter chooses to be assisted by polling place officials, poll watchers and election inspectors may observe the voting process, but if the voter asks to be assisted by a person the voter chooses, no one else may watch him or her vote.

It is illegal for a person assisting the voter to:

- Try to influence the voter's vote;
- Mark the voter's ballot in a way other than the way they have asked; or
- Tell anyone how the voter voted.

Voters May Use Interpreters at the Polls

Voters who cannot speak English, or who communicate only with sign language, may use an interpreter to help them communicate with election officials, regardless of whether the election official(s) attending to the voter can speak the same language as the voter. The voter may select any person other than the voter's employer, an agent of the voter's employer, or an officer or agent of a labor union to which the voter belongs. If the voter cannot read the languages on the ballot, the interpreter may also act as an assistant for the voter, but they must follow the procedures for an assistant. (See assistance section above for more



details.) If the voter is deaf and does not have a sign language interpreter who can accompany them to help communicate with the poll worker or read the ballot, the voter should contact his or her local election officials before the election and request assistance.

Curbside Voting

If a voter is physically unable to enter the polling place, he or she may ask that an election officer bring a ballot to the entrance of the polling place or to a car parked at the curbside. After the voter marks the ballot, they will give it to the election officer, who will put it in the ballot box. Or, at the voter's request, a companion may hand the voter a ballot and deposit it for him or her.

TIP FOR VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES: If you plan to go alone to vote curbside, it is wise to call ahead so election officials will expect you. Generally speaking, you may vote curbside during the early voting period (the 17th day before Election Day until the 4th day before Election Day for most elections) or on Election Day. For a May uniform election date or resulting runoff election or some special elections, the early voting period is the 12th day before Election Day until the 4th day before Election Day.

Voters May Vote Early, Either in Person or by Mail

Voters who vote during the early voting period may vote at any early voting site in the political subdivision that is holding the election. Alternatively, if a voter will be 65 years of age or older on Election Day, has a disability, or will be outside the county during early voting hours and on Election Day, the voter can apply to vote by mail. Simply submit a completed and signed Application for a Ballot by Mail any time from the 60th to the 11th day before Election Day to the proper county early voting clerk. An Application for a Ballot by Mail may also be submitted in person by the voter to the early voting clerk's office if the application is submitted not later than the close of regular business in the clerk's office by the 11th day before Election Day. Your Rights:

HEY, YOU HAVE RIGHTS!

As a registered voter in Texas, you have the right to:

- A ballot with written instructions on how to cast a ballot.
- Ask the polling place official for instructions on how to cast a ballot (but not suggestions on how to vote).
- Cast your vote in secret and free from intimidation.
- Receive up to two more ballots if you make a mistake while marking the ballot.
- Bring an interpreter to assist you as you qualify to vote if you do not understand the English language.
- Help to cast your ballot if you cannot write, see the ballot, or understand the language in which it is written.
- Report a possible voting rights abuse to the Secretary of State (1.800.252.8683) or to your local election official.
- Cast a provisional ballot if your name does not appear on the list of registered voters.
- (1) Cast a provisional ballot
 - (a) if you do not possess one of the seven acceptable forms of photo identification, which, if you are under 70, is not expired for more than four years, and you can reasonably obtain one of these forms of identification or
 - (b) if you possess, but did not bring to the polling place, one of the seven forms of acceptable photo identification, which, if you are under 70, is not expired for more than four years, or
 - (c) if you do not possess one of the seven forms of acceptable photo identification, which, if you are under 70, is not expired for more than four years, you could otherwise not reasonably obtain one, but you did not bring a supporting form of identification to the polling place, and
- (2) the right to present one of the acceptable forms of photo identification, which, if you are under 70, is not expired for more than four years, or, if you do not possess and cannot reasonably obtain an acceptable form of photo identification, the right to execute a reasonable impediment declaration and present one of the supporting forms of



identification, to the county voter registrar’s office, within six calendar days after election day, or, if applicable, qualify for a temporary (natural disaster or religious objection to being photographed) or permanent (disability) exemption, within six calendar days of election day, at the county voter registrar’s office.

- Vote once at any early voting location during the early voting period within the territory conducting the election.
- File an administrative complaint with the Secretary of State concerning violations of federal and state voting procedures.





Elected Offices & the Power They Hold

FEDERAL (*FEDERAL*)

Only the federal government can regulate interstate and foreign commerce, declare war and set taxing, spending and other national policies. These actions often start with **legislation** from Congress, made up of the 435-member House of Representatives and the 100-member U.S. Senate.

UNITED STATES REPRESENTATIVE (*Representante de los Estados Unidos*) - Two-year term. Also referred to as a congressman or congresswoman, each representative is elected to serve and represent the people of a specific congressional district in Congress. Among other duties, representatives introduce bills and resolutions to potentially become laws, offer amendments to laws and serve on governing committees.

STATE (*ESTADO*)

The state government oversees affairs within state borders. It raises income taxes and oversees state welfare programs, such as Medicaid. It also controls the state criminal code, maintains state roads, and carries out federal laws and programs at the state level.

GOVERNOR (*Gobernador*) - Four-year term. The governor is the executive of the state. They appoint members to boards and commissions; appoint statewide officials, and state judges and district attorneys; deliver the State of the State address; provide guidance to the state senate and house representatives; call special sessions of the state government and set the agenda for the state government. The governor can veto proposed laws, sign new laws, or allow proposed laws to become law without their signature.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR (*Gobernador Teniente*) - Four-year term. The lieutenant governor is the second-highest executive in the state. The lieutenant governor is also powerful because of their position as president of the Texas Senate, where they appoint the senators who hold leadership positions of committees; appoint senators to committees; decide which bills are discussed by committees; and control the Senate's agenda. The Lieutenant Governor is also a member of several commissions and boards, and serves as governor in the governor's absence.

ATTORNEY GENERAL (*Procurador General*) - Four-year term. The attorney general is the top lawyer in Texas, representing the state in mostly civil litigation. The Attorney General represents the state and state officials in legal matters, and oversees and administers state-wide civil and criminal manners.

COMPTROLLER of PUBLIC ACCOUNTS (*Contralor de Cuentas Públicas*) - Four-year term. The comptroller is the state official responsible for the state's money; collecting taxes, overseeing the state treasury and forecasting the amount of money that's available for the state's two-year budget.



COMMISSIONER of the GENERAL LAND OFFICE (*Comisionado de la Oficina General de Tierras*) - *Four-year term*. As head of the General Land Office, the commissioner manages state lands, including oil and gas properties and the Alamo. The commissioner chairs the Veterans Land Board, which administers programs for Texas veterans, and is responsible for environmental protection of Texas' coast. Other state boards chaired by this position are the School Land Board and the Coastal Coordination Advisory Committee.

COMMISSIONER of AGRICULTURE (*Comisionado de Agricultura*) - *Four-year term*. The agriculture commissioner's main job is promoting Texas' agriculture. They facilitate trade and marketing of agricultural products; regulate weights and measures of agricultural products; regulate pesticide use; certify organically produced products; administer the National School Lunch and School Breakfast programs; provide financial help to farmers; and help solve issues related to natural disasters.

RAILROAD COMMISSIONER (*Comisionado de Ferrocarriles*) - *Six-year term*. In Texas, the Railroad Commission regulates the oil and gas industry. Members of the three-person board are elected statewide. The commission regulates the oil and gas industry, gas utilities, pipeline safety, safety in the liquefied petroleum gas industry and surface coal and uranium mining. It has no regulatory authority concerning railroads.

JUSTICE, TEXAS SUPREME COURT (*Juez, Corte Suprema*) - *Six-year term*. A justice is one of the nine-member Supreme Court, which issues final decisions on court cases that have progressed up through the state appeals courts, issues orders to governmental officials to act and to individuals to appear before the court, and has the ability to give orders or judgements of trial courts, if the Supreme Court determines them important to the legal system of the state.

JUDGE, COURT of CRIMINAL APPEALS (*Juez, Corte de Apelaciones Criminales*) - *Six-year term*. A member of the nine-member court which has final judgment in all criminal cases. The court must review all cases in which the death penalty is assessed. It also has the ability to review other criminal cases and issues orders to governmental officials to act and individuals to appear before the court.

STATE BOARD of EDUCATION (*Miembro de la Junta Estatal de Educación Pública*) - *Four-year term*. The fifteen-member board decides curriculum, standards, student testing, special education programs, and textbooks for Texas public schools. It also oversees the Permanent School Fund.

STATE SENATOR (*Senador Estatal*) - *State senators serve one two-year term and two four-year terms*. The thirty-one members of the state senate are elected to the "higher ranking" half of the state's governing body. They pass bills on public policy matters, setting levels for state spending, raising and lowering taxes, and voting to uphold or override the governor's vetoes. When the state senate has made a decision, it is then sent to the state house of representatives for further debate and decision making by the state house of representatives.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE (*Representante Estatal*) - *Two-year term*. The one hundred and fifty members of the state house of representatives are elected to the "lower ranking" half of the state's



governing body. They pass bills on public policy matters, setting levels for state spending, raising and lowering taxes, and voting to uphold or override gubernatorial vetoes. When the state house of representatives has made a decision, it is then sent to the state senate for further debate and decision making by the state senate.

JUSTICE, COURT of APPEALS (*Juez, Corte de Apelaciones*) - *Six-year term.* The Court of Appeals hears appeals on civil and criminal cases from lower courts in their districts. Texas has 14 Court of Appeals that range in size from three to thirteen judges. Each Court of Appeals has one Chief Justice and at least two Justices that see over the court.

DISTRICT JUDGE (*Juez del Distrito*) - *Four-year term.* Each of the 477 district courts in Texas has one judge per court. The district courts are the trial courts that handle all felony criminal cases, divorce cases, cases involving title to land, election contest cases, and civil matters in which the amount of money or damages involved is \$200 or more.

CRIMINAL DISTRICT ATTORNEY (*Procurador Criminal del Distrito*) - *Four-year term.* The Criminal District Attorney in Hidalgo County is the attorney that represents Hidalgo County for all criminal matters for the county and works with law enforcement in the investigation of criminal cases.

COUNTY (CONDADO)

County government is the most responsive and transparent level of government in Texas, led by officials who live and work in the communities they serve. Local officials understand their county and its particular needs. Each Texas county has a team of locally elected and appointed officials who work full time to provide hands-on essential services that make government work for the people of Texas.

COUNTY JUDGE (*Juez del Condado*) - *Four-year term.* Depending on the size of the county, the county judge has a wide range of judicial and administrative duties and is the presiding officer of the governing body of the county, known as the commissioner's court. County Judges also serve as head of emergency management.

JUDGE, COUNTY COURT AT LAW (*Juez, Corte de Ley del Condado*) – *Four-year term.* This judge's position varies from county to county, but the county court at law judge serves in county courts that have general, civil, criminal or specialized jurisdiction.

JUDGE, COUNTY PROBATE COURT (*Juez, Corte Testamentaria del Condado*) – *Four-year term.* A probate judge deals with administration of estates. What that means is when a person passes away, if they don't have a Will, a probate judge will determine who controls the assets of the estate and who makes distributions. Then it is the state of Texas that decides when the assets are to be distributed.

DISTRICT CLERK (*Secretario del Distrito*) – *Four-year term.* The district clerk performs the duties assigned by the Texas Constitution as registrar, recorder and custodian of all court pleadings, instruments and papers that are part of any legal cause of action in the district courts.



COUNTY CLERK (*Secretario del Condado*) – *Four-year term*. The main duties of the county clerk are to serve as clerk of the county court and the county commissioners court, act as recorder of deeds and other instruments, issue marriage licenses and take depositions.

COUNTY TREASURER (*Tesorero del Condado*) – *Four-year term*. The county treasurer is responsible for the county's money and is charged with the safekeeping and investing of county funds. This includes the maintenance of all checking accounts under the care of the county treasurer and the disbursement of funds

COUNTY COMMISSIONER (*Comisionado del Condado*) – *Four-year term*. The county commissioner is responsible for roads and bridges within their precinct and makes policy-making budget decisions. Four commissioners, elected from a quarter of the county's population, serve along with the county judge on the commissioner's court. The Commissioners Court conducts the general business of the county and consists of the County Judge and four Commissioners. The Court adopts the county's budget and tax rate; approves all budgeted purchases of the county; fills vacancies in elective and appointive offices; sets all salaries and benefits; has exclusive authority to authorize contracts; and, provides and maintains all county buildings and facilities.

JUSTICE OF THE PEACE (*Juez de Paz*) – *Four-year term*. The justice of the peace presides over the justice court in cases involving misdemeanors, small civil disputes, landlord/tenant disputes and more. They also conduct inquiries and may perform marriage ceremonies.

COUNTY CHAIR (*Presidente del Condado*) - *Two-year term*. The County Chair is the leader of the local party in each county throughout the state. Some of their responsibilities include overseeing the Primary, Candidate Filing, and other elections; chairing County Executive Committee Meetings; organizing and leading the local party; as well as overseeing and/or assisting with precinct and county or Senate District Conventions as required.

WHAT PRIMARY DO I VOTE IN?

Texas is an open primary state, so registered voters may vote in either primary without declaring a party affiliation until you arrive at the voting center.
